Kobylarz: 'The best is yet to come'

Businessman Tom Boyle was looking for two things at the State of the Township Address by Supervisor Tracey Schultz Kobylarz.

"I want assurance the township is financially sound," said the managing partner of Norwood Boyle Construction Services, "and that the fire and police departments are stable."

After the address, Boyle, a 1976 graduate of Thurston High School, said, "I felt that her address was almost directed personally at me." The township has been through a difficult year, he said, "But I'm confident in the way she (the supervisor) is handling things."

It has indeed been a tough year, Kobylarz said of her third as supervisor. Tax revenue has dropped because of lower property values, she said, and the township had to cut \$3 million from the budget. "But we did it," she said, "without one layoff (this year), and without eliminating one program."

Kobylarz didn't say the worst was over. But things seem to be looking up slightly, she said. Not long ago the township had 2,000 vacant houses, she said, "now we have about 800. People still want to come to Redford Township," she said, because it offers good schools and a high quality of life.

"Our best days are ahead," she insisted. The supervisor credited department heads and township employees for being innovative and dedicated. But three years ago, she said, every employee did his or her job. "Now they do 10 jobs," she said, as they assume more duties and responsibilities.

The township has been forced to find new ways of doing things, Kobylarz said. One of those new ways was underscored when the supervisor introduced and then administered the oath of office to four new auxiliary firefighters.

They are the first part-timers on the department since the early 1970s, according to sources. But they won't be the last. Six other auxiliary firefighters are currently undergoing testing and background checks.
