About "Time-Balls"

The actual notion of a ball "dropping" to signal the passage of time dates back long before New Year's Eve was ever celebrated in Times Square. The first "time-ball" was installed atop England's Royal Observatory at Greenwich in 1833. This ball would drop at one o'clock every afternoon, allowing the captains of nearby ships to precisely set their chronometers (a vital navigational instrument).

Around 150 public time-balls are believed to have been installed around the world after the success at Greenwich, though few survive and still work. The tradition is carried on today in places like the United States Naval Observatory in Washington, DC, where a time-ball descends from a flagpole at noon each day - and of course, once a year in Times Square, where it marks the stroke of midnight not for a few ships' captains, but for over one billion people watching worldwide.

BALL FUN FACTS

- The Ball is a geodesic sphere, 12 feet in diameter, and weighs 11,875 pounds.
- The Ball is covered with a total of 2,688 Waterford Crystal triangles that vary in size, and range in length from 4 ¾ inches to 5 ¾ inches per side.

Letter to the Residents



December 17, 2018

Dear Residents,

I had the pleasure of visiting your community last week and was pleased to see and meet so many of you. Thank you for your warm welcome and hospitality.

It is evident that you take pride in your home and as your management agent our goal is to ensure we maintain the quality of your home. In order to successfully maintain that quality, we need your support. I'd like to bring to your attention a few items noted in your house rules that you'll need to adhere to:

- Please make sure you are properly dressed when visiting any common areas of the building according
 to the Senior/Disabled Subsidized Housing Resident Policy Handbook (House Rules). Page 5 of 26 no.
 10 states "DRESS CODE: Residents and Guest/Visitors must have shirts and pants/skirts/shorts (NOT
 JUST UNDERWEAR/NIGHT GOWNS and/or Pajamas) on at ALL TIMES when in any common area,
 including the hallways. It is not acceptable at any time (day or night) to go without appropriate
 clothing. Residents must also wear some type of footwear. Socks alone are not appropriate in any of
 the common areas.
- If you are a pet owner please be mindful of the Pet Policy, page 2 of 4 no. 6. It states "Location of Pets on Property: The pet must be kept in the tenant's apartment or the pet must be on a leash at all times whether inside the building or out on the grounds, and, at no time can it roam free except in the apartment of its owner. If the owner uses a retractable leash the length of the leash around other residents, equipment or furniture cannot extend more than 6 feet from the handle to prevent entanglement with persons or other objects. The owner of the pet must accompany their pet whenever they leave their apartment. Pets cannot be curbed/tied to entranceways, walkways, sidewalks, parking facilities, trees, plants, chairs, etc. Pets are not allowed in project community rooms or common area kitchens.

I am also asking that you be mindful of congregating in the lobby by the front entry door. It can get a little congested and sometimes difficult for visitors and residents to enter the building. It is also important that anyone coming into the building ring the apartment they are visiting and allow that resident to buzz them in.

VISIT OF THE SENIOR CLASS OF GLEN LAKE (MICHIGAN) HIGH SCHOOL, 9:50AM

Excerpt from the June 21, 1962 press release, The Office of the White House Press Secretary.

"Congressman Hechler, Congressman Griffin, boys and girls, I am glad to see you here. I must say I don't think that there is any group of high school students who have been more welcome in Washington and welcome here at the White House.

Is Duane Richardson here? I understand the young man might have come with you. Duane, I am glad to see you.

We want to say that we are particularly glad to welcome you for the reasons you know. The fact that this high school class spent several years in building up a \$700 fund to get them here to Washington and then to help a class-mate gave up their trip makes it really in a sense unnecessary for you to have come to Washington because all the things we hoped you might learn, all the lessons that a trip to this capital, this very old house might have taught you, I think you learned in your own home town in your own home school. But, nevertheless, I am glad you game anyway, and I do think it demonstrates that on occasions, on more occasions perhaps than we think, acts of generosity and consideration bring back returns many times."

Recipe Swap

SALTED PEANUT CRISPS

1 cup shortening (part butter or margarine)

1 ½ cups brown sugar (packed)

2 eggs

2 tsp. vanilla

3 cups Gold Medal Flour

½ tsp. soda

1 tsp. salt

2 cups salted peanuts

(quick mod.). Heat oven to 375° Mix shortening, and vanilla sugar, eggs, thoroughly. Measure flour by dipping method or by sifting. Blend together flour, soda, and salt; stir in. Mix in peanuts. Drop rounded teaspoonfuls of dough about 2" apart on lightly greased baking sheet. Flatten with bottom of greased class dipped in sugar. Bake 8 to 10 minutes, or until golden brown.

Makes about 6 dozen 2" cookies.

Note: If you use Gold Medal Self -Rising Flour, omit soda and salt.

PEANUT BUTTER CUPS

1 stick oleo, softened 2 cups peanut butter

1 lb. box (3 cups) confectioners sugar

1 cup brown sugar

Mix and spread on cookie sheet. It helps to take a sheet of wax paper and put over mix and roll with rolling pin.

Next, melt 12 oz. chocolate chips with 1 stick oleo. (melt in the microwave for 1 minute until you can mix the butter into the chocolate. 30 seconds at a time after that, if needed.) Spread on top of peanut butter mixture. Cool.
