Administrator Responds to Resident Survey

I promised that I would respond to people's concerns from the survey every month in the newsletter. Let me know if you have any questions.

High electric bill

Do you pay for electricity? Yes and no. Yes because every month you write a check to DTE while gas and water is free. No because every month you pay \$31 less in rent through the utility allowance from HUD. That utility allowance changes every year. If your bill is high, use less electricity, but make sure you have enough lighting so you don't fall.

Too many nonresidents have keys to building; safety is a concern

It is unrealistic for relatives not to have keys in a senior citizen building. People go in and out of hospitals regularly and there has to be a way for relatives to come and get clothing, checkbooks and mail. When a resident moves in, we fill out a form that lists who has what keys. When a resident moves from Warren Glenn, all keys - those held by the resident and those held by the relative – are collected.

Paid caregivers should not have keys. Residents should not make keys for their family -people should receive keys only from the office so we can keep track of them.

In terms of safety, if you are concerned about the behavior of someone's relatives, write down what you saw, where and when. We will look on the cameras. It does not help to say that something happened on the weekend: we need what, where and when. Remember too that residents are responsible and will be held accountable for the behavior of their friends and family.



Beauty Salon

Beautician Gloria Blood is here every Thursday. She offers a variety of services in the beauty salon on the second floor across from the lobby elevator. A signup sheet on the salon window includes a list of services and fees.

Chiropractor

Dr. Jamie Beck comes to our building on Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays at 10:30 AM. If you need to see the chiropractor, go to the exercise room on the second floor. No appointment is necessary. First time patients must bring their identification and insurance cards. Most insurances cover this service.

Podiatrist

Dr. William Rubin comes to the building approximately every six weeks. He will see you privately in your apartment. Watch for the sign-up sheet in the mailroom. After you sign-up, podiatry staff will contact you by phone to get your insurance information. Most insurance plans cover this service.

Prescription Delivery

CVS pharmacy at 12 Mile and Ryan will deliver prescriptions free of charge to our residents. The telephone number is 586-756-8900. Other pharmacies in the area may deliver too.

Schwan's Food - A deliveryman comes to the lobby of our building every other Wednesday at 4:00 p.m. He takes orders and fills them from his truck.

Mark's Remarks: Maintenance Tips

One of the nastiest things to happen in your apartment is an overflowing toilet. YUCK! To avoid this mess, please do not flush the following items:

- Adult undergarments
- Sanitary napkins
- Cleaning wipes
- Paper towels
- Bandages
- Q-tips or cotton balls
- Hair



- Pet poop (ESPECIALLY CAT POOP that has kitty litter on it. The litter is like cement and will destroy a toilet and pipes.)
- Food scraps
- Oils, paints or thick liquids

• Medications, pills and hazardous waste In other words, if it is not toilet paper or kleenex, it doesn't get flushed. Keep a small waste basket near your toilet so you are not tempted.

IMPORTANT: If your toilet starts to overflow there is a small water shut-off handle by the floor behind the toilet. Turn the handle clockwise immediately to shut off the water. Now call the office or find Mark. Do not use the toilet again until it is fixed.




The main purpose of the Activities Committee is to coordinate activities so that there is not a duplication of effort. We do not oversee every activity (we are not the boss so to speak), but we make sure that there is not a conflict of dates and purpose. It is really important that activities planned by residents be brought to the administrator first and then to the Activities Committee, so the calendar is clear and we do not step on each other's toes. We would like to spread activities out and work together so things run smoothly.

Our treasurer keeps the committee and residents informed about revenue and expenses (what comes in the bank account and what goes out). Money is raised for the Residents' Fund through 50/50 raffles, bottle returns and rummage sales. This money is used to pay for paper goods and food for dinners and birthday parties. Donations collected at the dinners help to pay for these expenses too. We keep our Residents' Fund healthy and costs low for residents in this way. Paper supplies can be used by authorized activities (bingo, etc.) when large groups are gathered, not just for dinners and birthday parties. If you are aware of supplies that are needed, please tell Betty Challenger.

If you have any ideas for games, menus, trips or entertainment, we are always open to ideas. See Diane or Betty, or write up your suggestions, put in an envelope marked "activities" and give to Diane or Betty. Your suggestion will be discussed at the next meeting. You do not have to sign your suggestion, but if you do it will be easier for us to follow up with questions and let you know what action the committee has taken. All ideas are welcome and will not be ignored.
